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Abela Mahimbo **University of Technology** Sydney

BIOGRAPHY

Dr Abela Mahimbo's success as an educator is due to her teaching and learning philosophy, which is to develop authentic and transformative learners using learner-centred approaches. Abela is a senior lecturer at University of Technology Sydney (UTS) and teaches both undergraduate and postgraduate students. She recognizes students as learning partners and use learner-centred teaching approaches to achieve high-quality teaching and learning experience. Dr Abela is aware of the challenges that students from CALD and other minority groups face in exercising agency, so she provides opportunities for students from these backgrounds to share their experiences. Her students recognise that her teaching and learning approach equips them with the relevant skills, knowledge and attributes for making real-life impacts.

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Sheikh Mohammad Alif **Federation University**

BIOGRAPHY

Dr Sheikh Alif is a Senior Lecturer of Public Health at Federation university. His PhD and postdoctoral research focused on occupational exposure and lung diseases that helped him attain reputable awards and recognition in the field. Dr Alif's research is contributing to public health strategies for preventing occupational lung diseases, influencing numerous public health and workplace health and safety guidelines. He has published in multiple peer-reviewed journals and is a highly cited author.

Dr Alif is also building a future generation of excellent researchers through teaching and supervision of graduate and postgraduate students. He has been maintaining an excellent teaching evaluation record and demonstrated his ability to integrate cuttingedge research into public health domain.

Early Career Researcher

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UQ Star Project (Team) **University of Queensland**

BIOGRAPHY

The University of Queensland Student Toolbox for Achieving Resilience (UQ STAR) program in the School of Public Health is a collaborative initiative between School of Public Health and School of Psychology at University of Queensland (UQ). The program has been developed to support the mental health and well-being of students. The program aimed to incorporating positive psychology interventions into the course contents of students.

The program also used the input of students' voices to improve the course contents and its effectiveness. The students responded that the program encouraged them in building stress management skills, building connection with others, and considering their future careers in public health. The findings from the UQ STAR program will be shared at 2024 CAPHIA Teaching and Learning Forum.

AWARD DESCRIPTION

This medal recognises the exemplary achievement of an individual who has significantly contributed to public health education in Australasia. The individual may or may not be in the more traditional public health space (for example, outside a university) but will demonstrate a history of driving improvements, innovations and capability building to advance public health education over their career.
